VVFD ELECTION FOR BOARD OF DIRECTORS – NEW PROCEDURES

Election for the VVFD Board of Directors will be at VVFD on **Friday, January 30** from **4 to 7 P.M.** Ballots will be available at the Fire Department. Members eligible to vote are property owners within the Volente Fire Department area or those persons registered to vote within that area. Voters may be asked to show proof of Membership by providing either a recent property appraisal notice or tax bill from Travis County, showing VVFD Service Area address or current voter registration card or driver's license with VVFD Service area address.

Voting shall be by secret paper ballot. Members unable to attend on January 30 may request a mail ballot by contacting Election Judge Dorothy Wilhelm at 8104 Joy Rd., Volente or dwilhelm@vvfd.net or calling 512 258-1530.

Following the election, a short annual meeting of the Volente Fire Department will be held. Purpose of this meeting will be to announce and introduce the new board members.

CANDIDATES FOR VVFD BOARD:

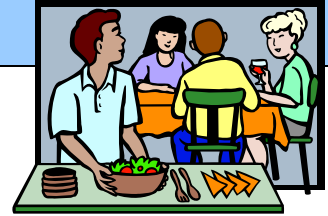

VVFD, VOV, VNA, ESD ????? CONFUSED? Dorothy Wilhelm, Editor

ESD – ESD #14 – Travis County Emergency Services District #14 is charged with the responsibility of providing emergency services and fire protection within its boundaries. Commissioners on the ESD Board are appointed by Travis County Commissioners. The ESD has the authority and responsibility for the taxes and funds for the services they provide.

VVFD – Volente Volunteer Fire Department – Volente Fire Department incorporated in 1961 as a non profit organization under IRS code 501(c)4, VVFD contracts with ESD 14 for a large portion of the ESD area. VVFD provides the fire and emergency services within this area on a reimbursement contract with the ESD. VVFD is run by a Board of Directors elected by the membership in VVFD. The Board of Directors exercise all authority of the Department in its operation and establishment of policies and procedures except as specifically delegated to the Officers of the Board or the Fire Chief by the Bylaws or by a specific resolution of the Board. Currently VVFD has a paid part time Fire Chief and two paid fire fighters on duty 24/7. A large number of volunteers support this staff and volunteers continue to be a large part of VVFD.

CPFD – Cedar Park Fire Department contracts with ESD 14 for a small portion of the ESD area – mainly the Twin Creeks & Bella Vista area.

VFD Auxiliary – the Auxiliary – members of VVFD who may not be firefighters but who support VVFD by holding fund raisers, community events and generally supporting the goals and purposes of VVFD.

VNA – Volente Neighborhood Association is a nonprofit organization that works with the entire community on issues of safety, the deep water pipeline and other citizen concerns.

VOV – the Village - Village of Volente – is an incorporated village in a two square mile area within ESD 14 and within VVFD. The Village is run by a Mayor and City Council elected from within the Village.

There has been some confusion about the relationship between the Village and VVFD. They are not one and the same – and one is not run by the other. Within many cities the fire department is run by the city, but in this case VVFD covers a larger area than the Village, was created long before the Village and is not run by the Village. Some of the confusion comes from the fact that the Village office is in the building owned by VVFD and most meetings of the Village are held there.

This is not to say that the Volente Fire Department, the Village of Volente and all the organizations in this area do not work very well and very closely with each other. They certainly do work greatly together. Many of the volunteers wear two or more hats – many are on boards of more than one organization.

The Mayor of Volente, Jan Yenawine, is a good example. Jan is a long time member of VVFD, a former Volunteer Fire Chief and continues to be one of the most active volunteer fire fighters.

ISO- INSURANCE SERVICES OFFICE

This past September, the Volente Fire Department completed an ISO review. What does that mean to you as a resident? Well first, ISO is an organization that evaluates fire protection in over 46,000 communities nationwide. Most insurance carriers use these ratings to establish your insurance premium.

We are pleased to let you know that Volente has been recommended to receive a lower rating of 8b. We are currently rated a 9/10. An example of potential saving for some of our residents: those homes that have a wood or stucco exterior can achieve a reduction of up to 11 %. An example of savings that a wood or stucco sided home insured for \$ 250,000 can see is \$225.00 annually. The Department hopes to be recommended for an even better rating during 2009.

VVFD AUXILIARY NEWS

The annual pancake breakfast was held on Saturday, November 15th. This year the Auxiliary netted \$337 through ticket sales and donations. These funds will be used to purchase necessary items identified by the fire department. Items purchased or partially funded for VVFD by the Auxiliary so far in 2008 include: a new phone system, a paging system for announcements, a new refrigerator, a television, additional chairs to match our new tables, and a storage building.

Thanks to everyone who ate, volunteered, and made monetary donations. And a special thanks to Norm Manley for bringing his oversized pancake griddle and to Starbucks (Four Points location) for donating the coffee.

The Blood Center of Central Texas also participated in our annual event with the Volente community blood drive. They parked their bloodmobile in front of the fire hall and a steady stream of scheduled donors and walk-ins kept them busy. Thanks to all of our community donors, Volente residents donated 26 pints of precious blood. This blood will be distributed to health care facilities in central Texas for children and adults who are living with cancer, having surgery, surviving a car accident, or recovering from other illnesses and injuries.

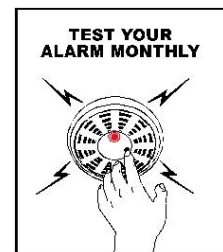
CHECK YOUR CHIMNEY

RESERVE / BACKUP FIRE TRUCK

The Department is pleased to announce that the ESD has purchased a used engine to back up our current engine that we have been operating for the past 4 years. This engine will allow us to have better back up coverage for routine as well as unplanned maintenance situations.

In addition, we will have the ability to draft water from the lake to fill tankers, potentially shortening the travel time to deliver water to the fire. Since our district does not have any fire hydrants, we must bring all of our water to the scene. This is done with tanker trucks. This engine can also help us with the relaying of water to fire scenes that are located remotely from the roads. We hope to have this engine in service by the end of December.



SMOKE DETECTORS

Have you checked your smoke detector lately? Everyone is encouraged to change your batteries at least annually. Also it is recommended to replace your smoke detector every ten years. Check this link from the CPSC for additional information.

A MESSAGE FROM YOUR VNA PRESIDENT

As we approach the Holiday Season it causes all of us to reflect on all that has happened in this past year. We are probably doing this even more this year due to the absolute uncertainty of the economy of the U.S., and certainly the economy of central Texas. We are seeing the impact of these times in the Volente area with VJ's shutting its doors and the volume of tourists and fun seekers on the lake dropping substantially. This is a time to pull together and to provide support to one another as good neighbors always do. The VNA has and will continue to work closely with the Volente Volunteer Fire Department, with whom we now share this newsletter, and with the Village of Volente, with whom we have worked closely through the last two years on the Deep Water Intake, pumping station and pipeline issue. On a more mundane note, we are hoping that these three entities will shortly be teaming together to install a new, shared, lighted bulletin board for all residents to use.

The issue of the pumping station and deep water intake seems to go in waves. Activity is increasing as we speak with two meetings planned in early December, one for input to the VOV Council by the residents, and a second major milestone meeting where our Council meets with council members from the other three cities. I also wanted to mention that I have been selected to serve on the Citizen's Advisory Committee for the Balcones Canyonlands Preserve. This federally designated and locally managed wildlife preserve is unique in the country and is something that Austin and Travis County should be very proud of. If any of you have any questions or issues regarding the BCP, please contact me and I will carry them forward.

Finally, let me plead with all of you for two things. First, we need your membership in the VNA. For only fifteen dollars a year you can ensure that our association stays actively involved in all issues that have an impact our this area, that we will arrange meetings and publish newsletters in order to keep all of you informed and aware, and it allows us take on projects such as the small park at the corner next to VJ's, and the lighted bulletin board that I mentioned above. Each of these things requires funding to make happen. The more of you that join the VNA, the more resources we will have to act on your behalf to do work in this area. Finally, we have a small group of dedicated people serving on our board of directors. I owe a big thanks to each and every one for the work that they are doing. **CEDAR PARK, ROUND ROCK AND LEANDER INTAKE FACILITY AND PIPELINE THROUGH
VOLENTE UPDATE**

Your efforts and membership to DELTA have made a huge difference! Over 65 letters asking for contested case hearings/public meetings were received by TCEQ on Leander's increased water right permit. The Project needs this permit for their funding. The momentum has changed! These changes took time and money. DELTA needs your help. In addition to VNA, please join DELTA! www.draininglaketravis.org

The joint meeting of the Village of Volente Council and the elected officials of the BCRUA Cities took place December 10. The three cities answers fell into three categories: it's too preliminary, we won't do anything to you that we wouldn't do to our own residents, and we'll send you that information.

The most interesting offer from the elected officials was for an independent engineering peer review of the project if the Village shared in the cost. Why have these three cities allowed this new water utility to proceed with a \$450M project without any independent oversight?

BCRUA Vice-President and Cedar Park Councilmember Mitch Fuller actually said, "Why would we need a second source of water?" Then Cedar Park Mayor Lemon quickly chimed in "LCRA has guaranteed us that we'll have water". Those statements received the biggest (and only) audience laugh of the night. These are their decision makers.

Leander Mayor Cowman's only comment was that Leander had an A+ bond rating. The Texas Water Development Board required Leander to have a one-year reserve fund. Is that required from cities with A+ ratings?

Many thanks to our Mayor and Council for being the strong voice of the Volente residents.

ADDITIONAL THOUGHTS ON THE BCRUA DEEP WATER INTAKE PROJECT

PROPOSED: To date this is an engineering design proposal for an intake site on the Gross' property in the Village of Volente. Commissioned by BCRUA and presented to them and our village to improve the design concept. To date it has not been presented to the citizens of Leander, Cedar Park, or Round Rock (Tri-Cities) who will ultimately be paying for the project in hopes of the repayment by new taxpayers/water users based on overly optimistic calculations of future growth.

UNNECESSARY: Given the current real estate downturn that historically have lasted a minimum of five years (without a recession/depression), the need for aggressive population growth planning is questionable. The current Sandy Creek site for Cedar Park Intake will supply water to within 20 feet of the new site's proposed depth and below that the water quality is questionable.

COST EFFECTIVE: Volente was picked as the best site for this project solely on the basis that it was the most cost effective due to minimum site preparation and nearness to the current Cedar Park Treatment Facility. Teaming with Austin's Oasis site was deemed more expensive. What if we were no longer the cheapest alternative?

VARIANCES: BCRUA will need variances to the Village's building codes, zoning, planning ordinances, and other restrictive covenants which were designed for the residential (and not commercial) community that we are. The Village Council will have to vote, on our behalf, to grant these variances to our ordinances against our collective stated wills.

DEMANDS: In order to placate the citizens of Volente, the BCRUA will have to offer incentives that will offset the pain and suffering a project of this magnitude will inflict on a small bedroom community like ours, not to mention the impact to the overall environment all Central Texans enjoy.

WHAT'S IN IT FOR US: In order make this a **FOUR** city project with Volente enduring all of the before, during, and after construction agony, we need plenty in return. When the BCRUA engineers finish dollarizing these demands, it may be cheaper to get the aquifer water that many sources have offered to them.

WHAT WOULD OFFSET THE MANY NEGATIVES OF THIS PROJECT?

1. Free water taps piped to all existing homes in and around the Village proper with future expansion through access to a main pipeline.
2. Fire hydrants piped to areas of current and future Village growth.
3. Payments from an unquestionable use bond set aside prior to construction for:
 - A. Structural damage to any building for any reason occurring during the construction phase.
 - B. Sound, dust, clutter, traffic congestion, blasting psychosis, temporary relocation of those directly affected by construction activities, and any perceived health damage caused by 2-5 years of intrusive commercial construction activities.
 - C. Damage to underground structures such as blast cracking of well casings, pipes, footings, etc.
 - D. Loss of salability of real estate and diminished property values resulting from this project before, during and after completion.
 - E. Legal cost redemption fund to offset identified personal or isolated situational relief related to this project.
4. Repair and repay for all infrastructure damage to roads, culverts, bridges, drainage piping, signage, cross walks, utility structures, and power outages that create a loss of goods and services.
5. Rebuild all streets and connecting roads to TxDOT Standards (that include bicycle lanes) within the Village and outside the Village to our main thoroughfares—Lime Creek Road to FM 1431 and FM 2769 to US 620.
6. Give the Volente Village Council, planning and zoning committee, and city attorney the approval or disapproval final say of current design plans and future design changes.

GOOD IDEA: What may have appeared to be a good idea when engineers are thinking of just moving dirt and people out of the way (like the Chinese do), may seem to be a bad idea when factoring in the costs and needs of the **FOURTH** city. Would the citizens of the Tri-Cities truly believe that an unnecessary, expensive, intrusive, destructive, legal nightmare of a proposed project like this one deserved a “yes” vote if placed in front of them? The citizens of the **FOURTH** city already know better!

SAFE HAVEN

Four years ago the **VNA** adopted **Safe Haven**, a local 24 hour a day low demand shelter for persons who are homeless and are living with symptoms of a mental illness. The goal of Safe Haven is to ensure a safe and accepting living environment, while providing qualified staff to establish a trusting relationship, and to guide each resident to review the choices in their lives. Safe Haven offers sixteen beds and eight semi-private rooms, three meals a day, and laundry facilities to all of their residents. It also provides a place for residents to heal and prepare for re-entry into society. **Safe Haven is in need of the following items:** sneakers for both men and women, warm jackets for both men and women, underwear for men, SOCKS, and easy reading books. **If you have any of the items listed above and are willing to donate them please drop them off at the Fire Hall in the white basket marked "Safe Haven".** We will make sure they get delivered to Safe Haven.
